The State Library is pleased to submit this report on the **FY08 Enrich Iowa: State Funding for Iowa Libraries** programs.

More than two-thirds of all Iowans have an active public library card. Libraries enrich Iowans' lives by contributing to education, lifelong learning, and local economic development efforts.

This report shows that Iowans checked out more than four million library items through the Open Access and Access Plus programs last year, and also demonstrates that Direct State Aid funding made it possible for local public libraries to upgrade their services to Iowans.

Enrich Iowa includes three parts:

- Open Access, the statewide library card program
- Access Plus, the statewide interlibrary loan subsidy program
- Direct State Aid for public libraries

The State Library provides the framework that makes these statewide library programs so effective. Enrich Iowa is a success, with clear and positive results. Open Access and Access Plus make Iowa's library resources available to all Iowans and are a vitally important part of library cooperation in our state. Direct State Aid improves library service for Iowans, as it was designed to do.

In addition to the statewide report, we have enclosed information for each legislator on the use of Direct State Aid funds by libraries within your legislative district.

## Enrich Iowa: Summary

Iowa libraries are essential elements of their communities, be they towns, schools, colleges or corporations. And in Iowa libraries are abundant with 543 public libraries; more than 80 college and university libraries; and about 1,400 school libraries.

The Enrich Iowa program improves library services for Iowans. In accordance with 2008 IOWA ACTS, Chapter 1181, Section 5 (4B), the State Library is pleased to submit this report on the impact of state funding on Iowans and their libraries.

Enrich Iowa includes three programs: Direct State Aid to public libraries, and the Open Access and Access Plus library resource sharing programs. \$2,773,428 was distributed to Iowa libraries in FY08.


**Direct State Aid** helped 473 Iowa public libraries provide programs for children and adults, and purchase books, supplies and computers they could not otherwise offer their customers. The program is designed to improve library service and reduce inequities in library services among communities; to enhance, not replace, local funding; and to encourage achievement of statewide public library standards. Since its inception in 1999, this funding has led to a 94 percent increase in the number of accredited libraries in Iowa, from 171 in FY99 to 331 in FY08. This report reflects the crucial role of this money in promoting lifelong learning; strengthening reading and literacy programs for children; providing safe, accessible buildings; improving Internet connections; and increasing the number of hours libraries can remain open. Direct State Aid funding in FY08 was \$1 million from the general fund.

**Open Access** lets Iowans walk into most any Iowa library and borrow books and other materials. Borrowers can simply return the materials to their local public library, which will pay to ship the items back to the loaning library. Open Access reimburses a small portion of the expense involved. Iowans checked out 3,829,169 items from 607 libraries through this program in FY08. Open Access funding in FY08 was \$1,282,686 (\$553,754 from the general fund and \$728,932 from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund).

**Access Plus** funding helps libraries borrow books and other materials from other libraries if their library doesn't own something a customer is looking for. The money is used to help offset the cost of mailing the materials back and forth. The 607 participating libraries loaned a record 269,598 items in FY08. Access Plus funding in FY08 was \$490,742 (\$269,676 from the general fund and \$221,066 from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund).


## Open Access



Established in 1989, Open Access allows Iowa library customers from a participating library to check out library materials at all other participating libraries in the state.

The number of items checked out has increased 68% from 2,273,845 in FY98 to 3,829,169 in FY08. Open Access funding in FY08 was \$1,282,686 (\$553,754 from the state general fund and \$728,932 from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund).

## Access Plus



Established in 1989, Access Plus provides Iowa citizens with equal access to all of Iowa's library materials through resource sharing among libraries. Libraries borrow books and other items from participating libraries to fulfill requests of their customers.

The number of items borrowed has increased 75% from 154,539 in FY98 to 269,598 in FY08. Access Plus funding in FY08 was \$490,742 (\$269,676 from the state general fund and \$221,066 from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund).

## Direct State Aid

State support for Iowa public libraries, or Direct State Aid, is intended to improve library services and reduce inequities among communities. Between FY98 and FY08, the number of Iowans with active library cards increased 22 percent, the number of items checked out went up 12 percent, and the number of library visits increased 41 percent.

The funding formula for Direct State Aid is composed of three tiers which include selected public library standards. Since the funding level increases with greater compliance with standards, the tiers provide incentives for improvements in library services.

Of Iowa's 543 public libraries, 329 received Tier 3 funding (highest level), 87 received Tier 2 funding, 57 received Tier 1 funding, and 70 were not eligible in FY08.


Iowans love and use their libraries. They are a fundamental part of Iowa's rich educational tradition. Below are a few observations from library directors about the impact of Direct State Aid.



Especially the westerns and christian fiction which were enhanced and very much appreciated. Also, Blue Ray and DVD's are in higher demand. We could not purchase these without Direct State Aid.

With the funding, we are always able to upgrade and provide our patrons with great Internet service!

By adding more AV materials we are able to offer more services to our patrons. Circulation of AV materials has more than doubled as a result.

Books for Babies is an initiative developed to highlight the importance of reading to babies. Research has proven that a child's first years are critical to language development; reading to infants is one of the best ways to encourage that development. A Books for Babies gift bag contains a board book, information for parents on the importance of reading beginning at birth, and a coupon that can be redeemed for another free book at any Story County library. These gift bags are given to all new moms who deliver at Mary Greeley Medical Center. This funding enabled distribution of 1200 gift bags. In addition, funding was spent on books that were given as prizes for youth summer and winter reading programs. To encourage early literacy development, the monies were used to purchase interactive boards that were installed in our youth department. Children can use their handprints for creative fun or experiment with humorous and realistic expressions with a "Make-A-Face" board.

Internet service helped a person whose business had been lost to the flooding in June. She maintained her business from the library until she was able to get back into her flooded building. Internet service also helped a family stay in touch with a soldier in Iraq.

Our patrons find them easier to read. Purchased children's books. We have a story hour program that has been going for over 30 years. For a small community, we have around 24 children who register and about 20 who attend the one hour program each week during the school year. Direct State Aid helps us to purchase craft items and incentives for our summer reading program. The board had no funds for programming this year and without DSA funds it would have been hard to do our program. Twenty five children attended the four week program. We are a small community with a limited amount of funds for materials. These funds help provide the large print we need to help our elderly to keep reading. Comment from one of our patrons, "I don't know what I would do if I could not read."
Armstrong	1368.9	Capital Improvements	Our building was in a state of disrepair. With the money from Direct State Aid, our building looks so much more inviting to our patrons.
Arnolds Park	1529.05	Personnel, Materials & Supplies, Library Programs	Direct State Aid allowed us to pay our library aide for extra hours to work the front desk one morning a week to free the director to give computer classes. We also purchased large-print books. The money also helps us pay for interlibrary loans. The morning book club has been successful so we are

			very happy to be able to afford to interlibrary loan extra copies of each book.
Arthur	413.23	Materials & Supplies	We need this funding to help us purchase new materials. It is getting harder to make our small budget stretch and this funding is a blessing!

They have already enjoyed using the card catalog, since ours had been out of order for about 3 months. Many people have appreciated the new receipt they receive when checking out items that is more complete. The next step will be to educate the patrons to use the on-line system at home so they can check the card catalog, see which books they have checked out, fines, and place reserves. It will make a large impact on Library service.
Aurelia	1392.74	Personnel, Technology & Equipment, Library Programs	Funds from the state of Iowa were crucial this year to meet staffing costs, primarily due to the increase in the minimum wage. We did not have to reduce the hours the library was open. The money was also used for DSL Internet access, for summer library program supplies and to supplement our budget for the summer library programs. We have seen an increase in the number of children attending which is wonderful, but costs us more for supplies and incentives. We like to give each participant a t-shirt; the kids love them and it promotes our library. Without these extra funds we would not have been able to purchase shirts for the increased number of kids. We would also have had to cut back on supplies and occasional snacks. This

			money did not make a difference in one person's life, it made a difference in the lives of 52 kids!

The library purchased a Dell Optiplex 330 computer for the circulation desk, replacing the Windows 98 computer. The library purchased Accelerated Reading tests from Renaissance Learning to provide tests for the library books purchased. We had found if there was not a test for a book, the kids were reluctant to check them out. Also, purchasing accelerated reader tests makes it easier for the school children to reach their reading goals and helps keep the library current and vital to the students.

We had a patron who moved to our town 6 months ago. She faithfully checked out books on tape to listen to on her drive to work. Recently she traded cars and the new one did not have a tape player, just a CD player. She was lost. We have a new collection to offer our patrons. Services to the public have been greatly improved in reference, readers advisory, and especially in technology by being able to attend workshops without closing the library. These funds allowed our audiobook patrons to keep up with some of the best-sellers in the audiobook collection. We have also amplified our juvenile book collection with new books in preparation for the Summer Reading Program on the topic of bugs and other nature topics. We have been weeding our nonfiction books in an effort to upgrade the usability of the collection, and the addition of 84 adult nonfiction books has given us a good start on this project.
