DIRECT STATE AID FUNDING USE & IMPACTS FROM IOWA PUBLIC LIBRARIES

This report details the amount and use of Enrich Iowa funding Iowa public libraries received for the Direct State Aid program. Annually, Iowa libraries are required to report on the use of this funding in set categories, but they are also given the opportunity to provide comments or stories on the impacts of these funds. The right column includes the comments submitted by Iowa libraries. Note, "NE" in the Amount Received column indicates "Not Eligible;" the library did not participate in the Direct State Aid program and did not receive funding.

This enables the searching of local history in the library or online by library staff, patrons, or the general public. The digitized information can be accessed from any computer with internet service and is searchable by topic, name, date, or other specific information. The searchable feature makes using this format a significant time saver for those doing research and staff can readily help or guide information seekers when they come to, or call the library. The

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					<p>total cost of this project was more than \$11,000. The use of the Direct State Aid monies was a great kick-off to the fundraising campaign that enabled us to secure three grants and many individual contributions helping us complete this project in less than one year. How this funding is making a difference to the La Porte City FFA Historical & Ag Museum in our community: The digitized copies of The Progress Review available through Hawkins Memorial Library's website have been an invaluable resource to the museum. Staff and volunteers have used the website to complete research and interpretation for new exhibits this year, including exhibits on the histories of La Porte City's schools and country schools in the area, local businesses and the changes on Main Street, and the high school FFA chapter and vocational agriculture education. Volunteers have also used the digitized copies of The Progress Review to add contextual information to our collections records. The museum hosted a weekly coffee time this winter (which will continue during the summer) for members of the community. During these coffee times, those attending discussed local history topics and we could look up information during and after our conversations to learn more. The museum director has referred members of the community to the website to help them answer questions they bring to the museum and has shown them how to navigate the website so that they can use it at home. The director has also used the website to become familiar with local history topics since she is not originally from La Porte City. Browsing through issues of The Progress Review to learn more about the community's history has made her a better and more knowledgeable resource for and host to museum visitors. She has used the website to prepare for elementary school field trips, during which students explore changes to La Porte City's Main Street and the reasons for those changes, among other topics. The website has also helped in the development of a teacher's guide to programs offered by the museum that are based on Iowa Core curriculum standards, and has been used to add content to summer youth programs. Staff, volunteers, and community members, have used the website through their involvement with the museum, and many others will benefit from the website through programs and exhibits offered by the museum. The museum is working to develop a walking tour of different areas of La Porte City, as well as a cemetery walk, and the digitized copies of the newspaper will be used extensively to complete these projects. Prior to the newspaper's digitization, any research required using either microfilm at the library or going to the bound copies of The Progress Review, which are very brittle. In addition, it was often difficult to know which years might be needed when doing research, so both methods were very time consuming with no guarantee of success. Because The Progress Review has been digitized, doing research is much easier and the bound copies of the newspaper can be preserved and stored to ensure their longevity.</p>

This provides patrons access to a wide range of digital media formats at no cost to them. As a small/rural library we are very limited on the collection size that we are able to maintain. Hoopla increased our patrons access to materials by 3571%, growing our collection from 14 thousand to over 500 thousand material items. It also expanded patrons and the library's access and use to technology. Many patrons were interested in Hoopla but did not have home computers, tablets, or smart phones. Seeing a need that was not being met, the library was able to purchase four tablets for check out. Now individuals that are interested in access an eBook, audio book, graphic novel, or movie from Hoopla are able to check out a tablet to do so.

As such, this year funds were spent on passes for local educational and entertainment locations through the Adventure Pass program. This program allows for libraries to purchase passes and invite patrons to "check out" a local destination for free once a year. Patrons can choose a date and take two adults and two children to the Greater Des Moines Botanical Gardens, Blank Park Zoo, Science Center, Brenton Skating Plaza, and Reiman Gardens. This program has been incredibly popular with many families and individuals taking the opportunity to explore a spot they may not have been able to afford to go to otherwise. Summer slide for youth in school is a combination of access to reading opportunities and books, and access to cultural and educational experiences. By offering these free adventure passes families have expanded access to local educational opportunities. We had a patron very excited to learn about this option so she could share

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					it with the families that she serves through her work with low-income families. APL offers access to the wider world of ideas through free wi-fi, desktop computers, laptops, and tablets that can be used in the library. Through DSA funding APL was able to add 20 hotspots to circulation that allow patrons to access the world with unlimited data and connectivity for up to 10 devices. Purchases included the hotspots, the service, and cases to circulate the hotspots. Ames Community School District students are issued devices in middle- and high-school, but those who don't have Internet access at home are challenged to keep up with schoolwork. Mobile hotspots can help mitigate that problem for Ames tweens and teens. The technology coordinator for the Ames School District was contacted about the availability of hotspots and said that this could be a great boon for his families that are experiencing challenges, are in transition, or are homeless. The Technology Coordinator and Student and Family Advocate planned to target some communication to make families aware of this option. The hotspots have been used continuously since they arrived, with people sharing stories of access for daily life use and to use the internet on their phones when they have no other technology. One woman shared a story of using the device to apply for a job from home and she was thankful she could do that because it was difficult for her to keep her three children occupied in the library while she did something like that and it was much easier to do at home. The remainder of the DSA funds were spent to replace worn furniture in APL's tween area. Heavy use of this area by local youth has led to significant wear and tear on some pieces of furniture. Refreshing the furniture makes the space more welcoming for youth and their families, and provides a new look to the space which is inviting to youth who are aging into use of the space. The new furniture allows for different configurations of seating and use of the space, which will make the space more flexible and able to be used by more youth.
